Located slightly northeast of San Francisco, Contra Costa County is home to 1,020,898 residents, the great majority of whom live in 20 cities and some unincorporated towns. The country covers about 733 square miles and is the 9th most populous among California's 58 counties.

WEATHER

Temperatures are mild for most of the year and rarely rise above 100 degrees. Rainfall occurs primarily between the months of September through May. Winter runs from December through February, when temperatures can drop between 30-50 degrees with many days filled with blue skies and sunshine.

DEMOGRAPHICS

Contra Costa County has a dynamic and diverse population. The area ranges from most affluent to families of modest means. The 2010 census tallied 614,512 Caucasians, 167,776 Hispanics, 151,469 Asians, 97,161 African Americans, 4,845 American Indian or Alaska Native and 3,466 Native Hawaiians or Pacific Islanders and 39,569 people of two or more races. Contra Costa usually ranks fourth or fifth in income across California's 58 counties.


